At the Kirkwood Benton County Center located in Vinton, our goal is to meet the needs of students and the community by offering a wide variety of educational opportunities and career experiences.

Kirkwood Benton County is excited to offer college credit courses to students enrolled at our partnering school districts (Benton Community, Center Point-Urbana, and Vinton-Shellsburg) through concurrent enrollment. Students can earn transferable college credit while exploring courses in a variety of fields. Concurrent credit opportunities include at our Benton County Center, Career Academies at our Linn Regional Center in Hiawatha, as well as courses offered onsite at our partnering high schools, online, or on other Kirkwood campuses.

Students can test the waters with one or two unrelated college-level courses, or complete one of our packaged Academy programs for career focused coursework. Students also earn high school credit necessary for their graduation requirements while taking these courses. Kirkwood's programs prepare students for careers in high demand industries that require post-secondary training. These opportunities enable students to fast track their education at no cost to their families.



*Students must be 16 prior to the first day of their scheduled Nurse Aide course. Completion of high school biology within the last two years, with a grade of C or higher is recommended. Students must obtain 79 or higher in the Nurse Aide course to move on to clinical experience. There are no excused absences for Nurse Aide, per state regulations. Students must arrange their own transportation to clinical experience and be prepared for time commitment outside of academy class to complete the clinic requirements. Health immunization requirements (*if applicable) are shared with students at orientation and must be completed prior to the first day of the scheduled Nurse Aide course.*

College Credit & Career Exploration: Kirkwood Opportunities for High School Students

Kirkwood's College Credit in High School (CCHS) program and Workplace Learning Connection (WLC) are free, once-in-a-lifetime opportunities that no student should pass up. Taking part now means you'll graduate more confident, more prepared, and with fewer "what ifs" down the road.

Why College Credit in High School? (CCHS)

Save Big – Tuition-free college classes + free textbooks. That's hundreds (sometimes thousands) of dollars saved.

Get Ahead – Knock out college credits while you're still in high school, giving you a jumpstart toward a degree or career training.

Figure Out Your Future – Test-drive courses connected to careers so you know what inspires and excites you before you graduate.

Build Confidence – Learn how to handle college-level work now, while you have support, so you're not overwhelmed later.

Workplace Learning Connection (WLC): Explore Careers Beyond the Classroom

With Workplace Learning Connection, you can step out of the classroom and into the real world. WLC connects you directly with local employers so you can see, experience, and explore what careers are really like.


Job Shadows (10th – 12th) – Spend a few hours alongside a professional and see what their career looks like in action.

REQUIREMENTS FOR COLLEGE LEVEL CLASSES

Senior Year Plus Requirements

The Iowa Department of Education's Senior Year Plus program is designed to give high school students access to challenging, advanced learning opportunities that help prepare them for life after graduation. As part of this initiative, Kirkwood partners with area school districts to help students build essential skills for their future and earn college credit through concurrent enrollment courses and Career Academies.

Please note that restrictions on participation in Senior Year Plus opportunities cannot be placed by the local school district. Examples include:

- Districts can't restrict a student's access to SYP courses by requiring them to complete the entire district curriculum first.
- Districts can't limit the number of courses a student can take in an academic year; however, Kirkwood does limit to 18 credit hours per semester — anything more requires dean approval.
- Districts may not limit the format in which a class can be taken.

For more details about eligibility and next steps, students and families should connect with their high school counselor.

Arts and Sciences Coursework

To participate in arts and sciences courses, also referred to as liberal arts, students must demonstrate proficiency in each of the three academic areas — math, science, and reading, as indicated by Iowa Assessment Testing or an alternative measure of proficiency adopted by the school board. Alternative measures of proficiency may vary by school district. Students must also satisfy Kirkwood Community College prerequisites as needed.

Career Academy – Career & Technical Education (CTE) Coursework


Participation in career and technical courses is not based on proficiency of Iowa Assessment Testing. Students will need to satisfy Kirkwood Community College's prerequisites as needed.

Required Orientation and Onboarding for Students

To help ensure every student starts strong, **all CCHS students are required to complete the College Credit in High School Orientation course in Talon**. This online course includes important modules designed to set students up for success. Topics include navigating Talon, understanding student policies and expectations, and learning about resources and support available through Kirkwood. Completing this required orientation after applying for admission helps students feel prepared and confident as they begin their CCHS journey.

In addition, **students participating in a Career Academy at a Regional Center are expected to attend an Onboarding Night**. This in-person event is designed to give students a head start by introducing them to their academy's expectations, faculty, and Regional Center staff. Students will also meet peers, tour labs and classrooms, and have the chance to get their questions answered before classes begin.

Together, the online orientation and Onboarding Night provide the tools, information, and connections students need to start their college credit experience successfully.



OPTIONS TO EARN CCHS AT KIRKWOOD

1

Career Academy and Regional Center Offerings

These courses are dedicated to high school students and occur at one of four regional centers: Jones County Regional Center in Monticello; Kirkwood Center at the University of Iowa in Coralville, Linn County Regional Center in Hiawatha, or Washington County Regional Center in Washington.

2

Alternative Concurrent Enrollment – Online or at a Kirkwood Location

High school students join an existing college class. These courses are not solely dedicated to high school students, but are college courses high school students are eligible to join along with traditional degree-seeking students; many of these courses are offered online or at Kirkwood's Main Campus. In Alternative Concurrent Enrollment, students will be taking the course with a Kirkwood paid instructor.

3

Onsite at Partnering High Schools

Concurrent enrollment courses at the high school, taught by a Kirkwood-credentialed high school paid instructor. Onsite sections are created and dedicated to high school students.

UNDERSTANDING THE AWARDING OF COLLEGE CREDIT AND TERMS

Concurrent Credit – Term used to define college courses taken while in high school, allowing students to earn both high school and college credits simultaneously. May also be referred as dual enrollment. Students will earn college credit by successfully passing the course.

High School Credit – Students with a passing grade will receive credit from their high school. Individual school districts determine whether the high school credit will be awarded to meet high school core curriculum requirements or elective requirements.

College Credit – Students will receive college credit from Kirkwood Community College. An official college transcript will be created and the grade earned will be reflected on the student's official college transcript. Students will earn college credit by successfully passing the course.

Transferring Credit – Students not planning to attend Kirkwood after high school graduation should plan to include their official Kirkwood college transcript as part of their application to other colleges and universities. Kirkwood strives to ensure that academic level courses transfer to other institutions and has transfer agreements with many state universities and colleges. If a student plans to attend a private college or an institution out-of-state, please contact that college directly to determine how credits earned will transfer.

Advanced Placement (AP) – A program that offers college-level courses and exams to high school students. Scoring well on the AP exam may result in earning college credit for the course, depending on the receiving college’s policies. Most colleges require a minimum score of 3 or 4 to earn credit. See specific college websites for more information.

RAI Scores – Iowa’s three Regent universities assign a Regent Admission Index (RAI) score based on test scores, class rank, GPA, and the number of core courses you’ve completed. Some of these classes may factor into your RAI. For more information, visit <http://www.regents.iowa.gov/RAI>.

Weighted High School GPAs – Some high schools use a weighted GPA scale to recognize the extra challenge of advanced courses like AP classes or concurrent enrollment/college credit courses. On a regular GPA scale, grades are measured on a 4.0 scale (with an A = 4.0). However, when a course is considered more rigorous, schools may give it extra weight on a 5.0 scale.

This system rewards students for taking more challenging classes, so strong performance in these courses can boost their overall GPA. Conversely, poor performance can effect them, too. Students should check with their high school counselor to learn how their school calculates GPA and if weighted grades are applied within their school district.

PROFILE OF A COLLEGE CREDIT IN HIGH SCHOOL (CCHS STUDENT)

Experience the Kirkwood Advantage

- **75.5% of CCHS students enroll in postsecondary education** the fall semester after their high school graduation – compared to 50.4% of non-CCHS students.
- On average, those CCHS students who do enroll in postsecondary education directly after high school are **15.4% less likely to drop out**.
- CCHS students have **higher GPAs, higher graduation rates, change majors less and add minors and second majors more**, than students without CCHS experience.

Compared to students with no prior CCHS experience, Kirkwood CCHS graduates:

- Earn degrees in less time.
- Experience a higher 3-year graduation rate.
- Have less college debt.

NOTE TO PARENTS/GUARDIANS OF CCHS STUDENTS

As part of Kirkwood's College Credit in High School (CCHS) program, your student is participating in college-level coursework.

It's important to understand a few key points about FERPA and the college classroom experience.

FERPA and Student Records

Under the [Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act \(FERPA\)](#), colleges are legally required to keep student records confidential. This means that most communication regarding grades, assignments, and course progress will go directly to the student. You are encouraged to maintain open lines of communication with your student and support them in checking their accounts. Some tips for staying informed:

- Most instructors use a class management system called Talon. Your student should be able to log in and show you assignments, grades, and attendance.
- Midterm grades or pass/fail indicators are available each semester through your student's MyHub account.
- If you have a concern, work through your high school counselor. Our partnership with school districts allows us to maintain communication regarding concurrent enrollment courses.
- In certain cases, students may choose to release FERPA information to parents or guardians. Contact our office for guidance on this process.

College Classroom Expectations

College courses are designed to prepare students for higher education and career success by introducing new ideas, developing critical thinking, and building communication skills. Because of this:

- Faculty may present topics that are different from what students typically encounter in high school, encouraging students to think in new ways.
- Students may interact with classmates and instructors who have different experiences, perspectives, or beliefs. College classrooms are intended to be safe spaces for respectful discussion and civil discourse.
- Each course has specific learning outcomes that all students must achieve, no matter the instructor, delivery method, or location. This consistency ensures that:
 - Credits transfer smoothly to Kirkwood's partner institutions,
 - Students are fully prepared for the next course in a sequence, and
 - Students meet prerequisites for college programs and advanced coursework.
- Faculty may use different teaching approaches based on their expertise, but the standards ensure students develop the skills and knowledge necessary for success both in college and beyond.
- Students are expected to actively engage in the learning process by respecting different viewpoints, participating in discussions, practicing critical thinking, and taking responsibility for their own learning and growth.



CAREER ACADEMIES OFFERED AT KIRKWOOD'S LINN REGIONAL CENTER IN HIAWATHA*

Career Academy programs prepare students for post-secondary education and careers by offering a college-preparatory curriculum focused on a specific career theme.

Career Academy experiences often feature partnerships with employers, community organizations, and local colleges, providing access to resources and experiential learning opportunities.

ALTERNATIVE CONCURRENT CCHS OPPORTUNITIES

Online or at a Kirkwood Location

Depending on a student's location, the alternative concurrent enrollment course could be offered at Kirkwood's Main Campus or online.

Why Consider Online Classes?

Online courses offer a flexible and convenient learning option for students with varying schedules and commitments. High school students are busy balancing school, part-time jobs, family, or extracurricular activities and more. Online learning opportunities provides the ability to access coursework from anywhere, at any time. These courses often allow for self-paced study, enabling you to learn at your own speed while still meeting required deadlines.

For students who thrive in independent environments, online courses can be an excellent way to pursue educational goals without the constraints of a traditional classroom schedule.

What Types of Students are Successful in Online Courses?

Success in online courses often comes down to self-discipline, time management, and a proactive approach to learning. Students who excel in online courses tend to be organized, motivated, and comfortable with technology. They are able to set aside dedicated time for studying and consistently manage their workload without needing frequent reminders from instructors. ASSOCIATE OF ARTS DEGREE PATHWAY: EARLY COLLEGE EXPERIENCE

Are you motivated, dedicated, and ready to challenge yourself?

Kirkwood Community College's **Early College Experience Pathway** gives high school students the unique opportunity to earn an **Associate of Arts (A.A.) degree** while still in high school. This option is designed for students who want to accelerate their education and open doors to future college and career opportunities.


Through a combination of courses offered at your high school, on a Kirkwood campus, and online, you can complete the requirements for an A.A. degree at the same time you're earning your high school diploma.

Planning is key. Because this pathway requires careful coordination, students must meet with an academic advisor to create a personalized degree plan before getting started. Academic advising appointments will also be required at different points along the way to make sure you're meeting both high school and Kirkwood graduation requirements.

Start early. The earlier you plan, the more flexible your schedule can be and the smoother your path toward completing the degree will be.

Is this pathway for everyone? Not necessarily. Earning a college degree while still in high school takes strong commitment, excellent time management, and a willingness to take on challenging coursework. But if you are motivated and dedicated, the payoff is big: you'll graduate high school with a college degree in hand, and a head start on your future.
