Dear Parents, Students and K-12 Partners,

We are excited to share the 2025-2026 Program of Study for Washington County. In this Program of Study students and parents now have information about all Kirkwood College Credit in High School (CCHS) opportunities available within Washington County. We encourage you to review this packet in its entirety to learn more about Career Academy opportunities at the Washington County Regional Center, as well as courses available onsite at our partner high schools, and even online.

Last year alone, nearly 500 high school students in Washington County were served through partnerships with seven local high school districts. We are thankful to continue our partnerships with Highland, Keota, Lone Tree, Mid-Prairie, WACO, Washington, Hillcrest Academy and home school associations. High School students from Washington County enrolled in College Credit in High School programming at no cost, earning both high school and college credit, and saved over **\$973,000** in tuition costs! In addition to saving time and money, these CCHS opportunities and Career Academies help students explore careers, develop technical skills, earn industry credentials, earn transferable credits, and give them confidence to succeed in their post-secondary goals.

Students and parents considering CCHS options are encouraged to attend a **College Credit in High School Informational and Registration Night** to learn more about CCHS offerings, student expectations, and ask questions. This informational night will be held **Wednesday, February 5, 2025 at 6:30 pm at the Kirkwood Washington County Regional Center**. Students may register for 25-26 Career Academies this evening as well.

Students attending Washington County Regional Center Academy programming for 2025-2026 will be **required** to attend the in-person event, **Career Academy Onboarding Night**, in April to meet with faculty, tour labs and classrooms, and learn more about academy specific requirements. Additional details on event date and time will be shared with students by email. Parents are encouraged to attend as well.

As students begin planning their schedules and consider dual-credit opportunities while in high school, please do not hesitate to contact Kirkwood or your high school counseling office with any questions you may have.

We look forward to working with students as they jump start their college experience and explore their future career through Kirkwood concurrent credit classes. Best of luck this school year!




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What is College Credit in High School (CCHS)?

Kirkwood partners with area high school districts to prepare students to learn essential skills and earn college credit through a variety of concurrent enrollment options. Credits earned through these partnerships count toward a student's high school diploma AND their future college degree – **all at NO COST to the student or their family!**

Requirements for College Level Classes

Senior Year Plus Requirements

As defined by the Iowa Department of Education, Senior Year Plus is an important part of high school reform efforts in Iowa. Through these programs, high school students are provided rigorous opportunities for advanced learning. Iowa law requires students, instructors, and institutions to meet certain criteria to be eligible to participate in Senior Year Plus programming.

To participate in CCHS, students must satisfy all Kirkwood Community College prerequisites, which may include satisfactory placement scores or GPA requirements prior to registration. For more information, contact your high school counselor.

All students are required to complete College Credit in High School Orientation course in Talon.

This orientation course offers several modules of important information that all students need to know so that their CCHS experience begins successfully. Important topics such as Navigating through Talon, Student Policies and Expectation, Student Resources and Support, as well as others, will be covered. CCHS Orientation can be completed after application to admission at www.kirkwood.edu/talon.

Students participating in a Career Academy at a Regional Center location are expected to attend "Onboarding Night."

This is in addition to completing the CCHS Orientation course in Talon. Students attending Onboarding Night will learn more about their specific academy experience and expectations, meet with academy faculty, Regional Center staff and students, tour labs and classrooms, and ensure all questions are answered.



Options to Earn CCHS at Kirkwood

Career Academy and Regional Center Offerings

Shared career academy programming at a Kirkwood location. These courses are dedicated to high school students and occur at one of four regional centers: Jones County Regional Center in Monticello; Kirkwood Center at the University of Iowa in Coralville, Linn County Regional Center in Hiawatha, or Washington County Regional Center in Washington.

2 Alternative Concurrent Enrollment – Online or at a Kirkwood Location

High school students join an existing traditionally offered college class. These courses are not dedicated to high school students, but are college courses high school students are eligible to join along with degree seeking students; many of these courses are offered online or at Kirkwood's Main Campus. In Alternative Concurrent Enrollment, concurrent enrollment students will be taking the course with a Kirkwood paid instructor.

3 Onsite at Partnering High Schools

Concurrent enrollment courses at the high school, most often taught by a high school paid instructor. Onsite sections are created and dedicated to high school students.

Awarding of Credits/Grades

High School Credit: Students with a passing grade will receive credit from their high school. Individual school districts determine whether the high school credit will be awarded to meet high school core curriculum requirements or elective requirements.

College Credit: Students will receive college credit from Kirkwood Community College. An official college transcript will be created and the grade earned will be reflected on the student's official college transcript.

Transferring Credit: Students not planning to attend Kirkwood after high school graduation should plan to include their official college transcript as part of their application to other colleges and universities. Students can request a copy of their transcript at https://www.kirkwood.edu/transcript or by logging into MyHub. Kirkwood strives to ensure that academic level courses transfer to other institutions and has transfer agreements with many state universities and colleges. If a student plans to attend a private college or an institution out-of-state, please contact that college directly to determine how credits earned will transfer.

RAI Scores: Iowa's three Regent universities assign a Regent Admission Index (RAI) score based on test scores, class rank, GPA, and the number of core courses you've completed. Some of these classes may factor into your RAI. For more information, visit <u>http://www.regents.iowa.gov/RAI</u>.



Profile of a College Credit in High School (CCHS) Student EXPERIENCE THE KIRKWOOD ADVANTAGE

75.5% of CCHS students enroll in postsecondary education the fall semester after their high school graduation – compared to 50.4% of non-CCHS students.

On average, those CCHS students who do enroll in postsecondary education directly after high school are **15.4% less likely to drop out**.

CCHS students have **higher GPAs**, **higher graduation rates**, **change majors less and add minors and second majors more**, than students without CCHS experience.

CCHS Student Resources & Support

CCHS students have access to a wide range of free personalized study supports and student resources. Recognizing that each CCHS student's journey is unique, study support options are tailored to your preferences and learning styles.

Note to Parents/Guardians of CCHS Students

Through the **Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)**, colleges are bound by law to keep student records confidential. Therefore, communication from Kirkwood will go directly to the student. You are encouraged to keep open lines of communication with your student. Some helpful tips:

- Most faculty use a class management tool called Talon. Your students should be able to log into their Talon account for the class and show you any assignment, grade, or attendance that the instructor had tracked for them.
- Midterm grades or pass/fail indicators are given each semester. Your student should be able to log into their MyHub account and show you their midterm grade.
- Work through the high school counselor when you have a concern. Our Kirkwood partnership allows us to stay in open contact with the school district since concurrent enrollment classes are offered for high school and college credit.
- In some instances, students may choose to release FERPA information. Contact our office for more information on this process.

Special note to students and parents: Each course at Kirkwood has an approved list of student learning outcomes that must be met regardless of the course location, delivery method, or audience. This consistency ensures the courses will transfer smoothly to our transfer partner institutions and that students are prepared for the next course in a sequence or for programs that have prerequisites.

College faculty can select their own approach in meeting the student learning outcomes based on their academic expertise, past experience, and review of best practices.

College courses are designed to introduce students to a specific area of study while also developing things like critical thinking skills and communication skills. The curriculum is meant to be challenging and may introduce ideas with which you are unfamiliar or that invite you to think in new ways. You may interact with other students or faculty who have experiences or beliefs very different from your own. A college classroom is a place for freely sharing ideas in a way that is respectful, thoughtful, and demonstrates the ideal of civil discourse.



Career Academies Offered at Kirkwood's Washington County Regional Center

Career Academy programs or majors are specialized, supportive learning environments for high school students, designed around a college and career theme.

They prepare students for post-secondary education and careers by offering a college-preparatory curriculum focused on a specific career theme, and often feature partnerships with employers, community organizations, and local colleges, providing access to resources and experiential learning opportunities.

Academies consist of three or more courses in a career-focused series, where students learn alongside peers with similar career interests.



MANUFACTURING, TRADES, AND TRANSPORTATION

Welding Registered Apprenticeship (RA) Option - Students can participate in a RA program, which provides students the ability to work in the community at a location of their choosing while earning a competitive wage. Students are required to complete 2,000 hours at their location of employment. Upon completion, students will receive a nationally recognized certificate that will build their resumes and help them develop a competitive advantage in their selected pathway.

By the end of the academy, you'll have a strong foundation in patient care that will open doors to endless opportunities in healthcare. Plus, you'll earn your CPR and CNA certifications, giving you a head start in a rewarding and respected career. Nurse Aide Registered Apprenticeship (RA) Option - Upon completion of the Nurse Aide course, students are able to participate in a RA program. This program provides students the ability to work in the community at a location of their choosing while earning a competitive wage. Students are required to complete 2,000 hours at their location of employment and complete a 70 hour online course, Geriatric Specialist, HSC-224. Upon completion, students will receive a nationally recognized certificate that will build their resumes and help them develop a competitive advantage in their selected pathway.Grant funds available and managed through Grant Wood AEA to off-set costs associated with the program for schools, employers and students.

This is a 1-semester experience. Students have the option to enroll in Exploration of Healthcare Careers and Nurse Aide during either Fall OR Spring semester. Additional coursework of the student's choice is completed the additional semester.

Students must be 16 prior to the first day of their scheduled Nurse Aide course. Completion of high school biology within the last two years, with a grade of C or higher is recommended. Students must obtain 80 or higher in all Nurse Aide course exams to move on to clinical experience. There are no excused absences for Nurse Aide, per state regulations. Students must arrange their own transportation to clinical experience and be prepared for time commitment outside of academy class to complete the clinic requirements. Health immunization requirements (*if applicable) are shared with students at Career Academy Onboarding Night and must be completed prior to the first day of the scheduled Nurse Aide course.


