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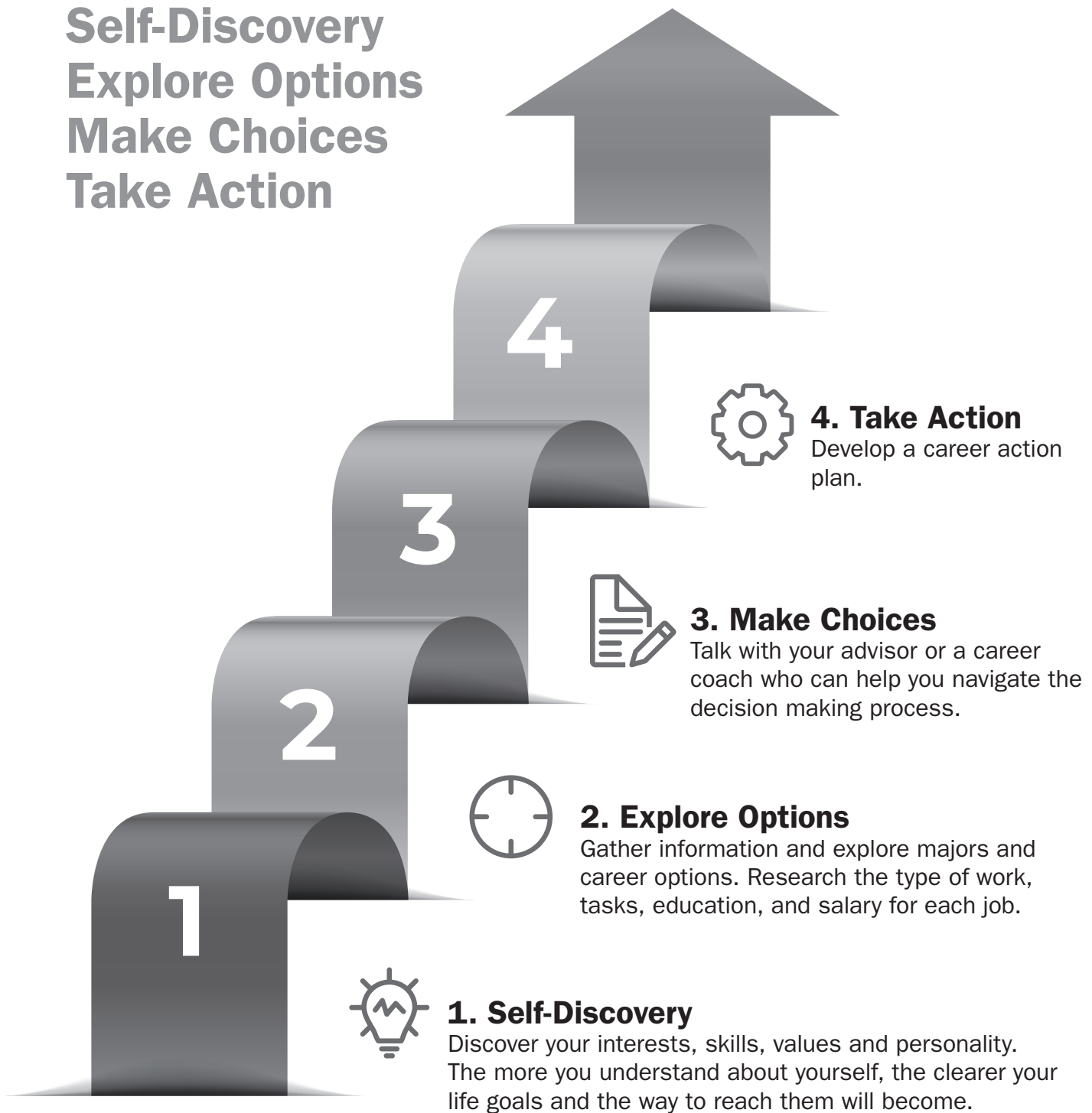

CAREER DEVELOPMENT PROCESS

Career development is a process that happens across the lifespan. It is a 4 step process that often repeats itself as we constantly assess ourselves then make changes and adjustments based on our own self-assessment.



STEP 1: SELF-DISCOVERY

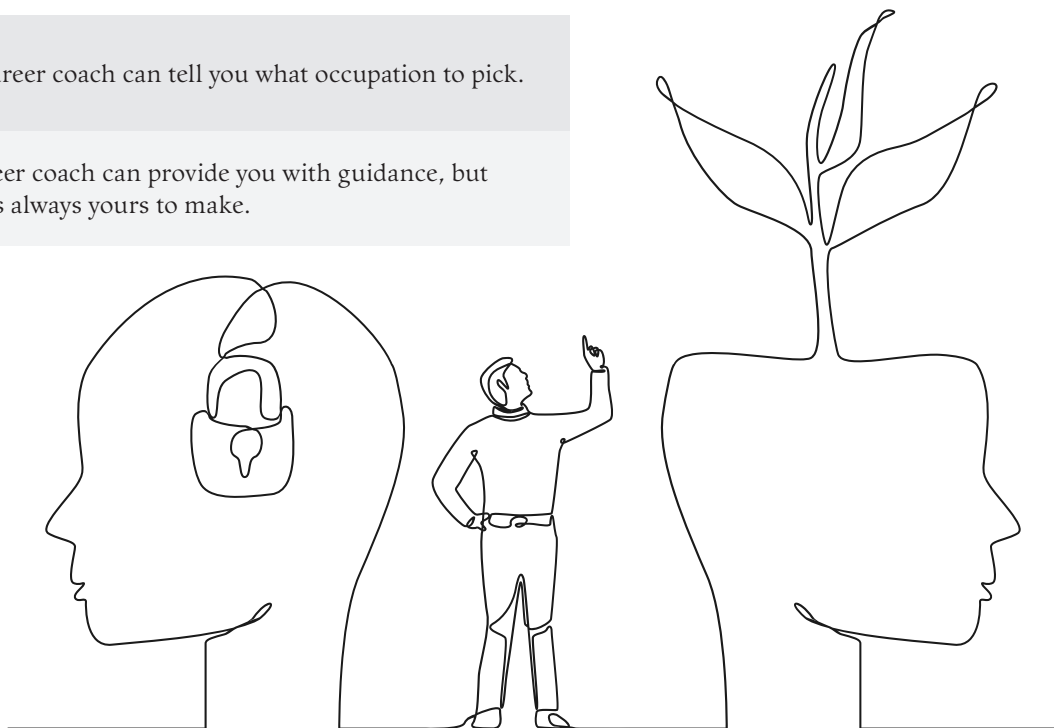
Discover your interests, skills, values and personality. The more you understand about yourself, the clearer your goals and the way to reach them will become.

Keep an Open Mind

In order to truly explore different pathways, utilizing a growth mindset will be key. As you explore your options, try to notice fixed mindset moments and re-consider those with a growth mindset instead.

MYTH: A career coach can tell you what occupation to pick.

FACT: A career coach can provide you with guidance, but the decision is always yours to make.



Fixed Mindset

My skills and abilities are innate gifts.

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STEP 2: EXPLORE OPTIONS

Gather information and explore programs and career options. Learn more about the type of work, tasks, education, and salary for each job.

Some programs at Kirkwood lead right into the workforce after graduation, while others are designed to transfer to a 4-year college/university. Typically, they are divided as follows:

Certificate, Diploma, and A.A.S. Programs → Workforce

A.A. and A.S. Programs → Transfer to 4-year Institution

In-Person Exploration Resources

Another great way to gather information about careers is directly from professionals who work in those roles. It is important to prepare for these conversations. Ask yourself, *What do I already know? What do I hope to learn?*

► Connect With A Faculty Member

Meet with a faculty member in the program you are considering. Which of the following questions would you like to ask?

- What are some of the most important skills and qualities needed to be successful in this program/future career?
- What sorts of assignments and projects do students engage in during this program?
- Is there an internship requirement? If so, when will I have to do that in the program?
How do I find one?
- What are some of the advantages and challenges of this program/career?
- Immediately following graduation from this program, what types of jobs would I be a strong candidate for?
- How do you think this industry or career might change in the future?

► Career Conversations

Career Conversations are 20 – 30 minute discussions with a professional currently working in a field of your interest. They are an opportunity to learn more about a specific field, a professional's role, education requirements, training, and more.

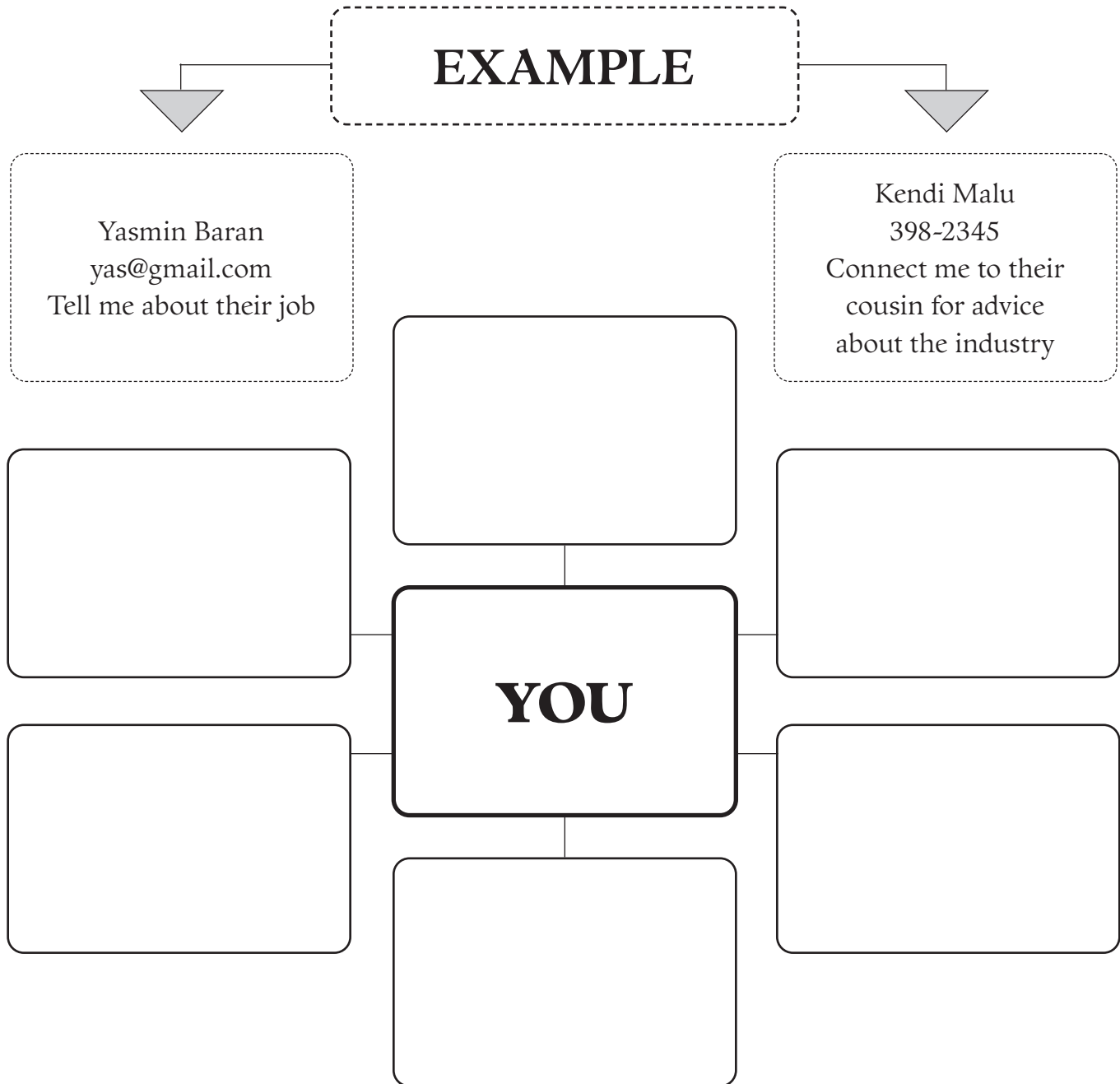

Questions to Ask During Career Conversations & Job Shadows

- ☐ How did you enter this field and what are common entry-level jobs?
- ☐ What are your main responsibilities and a typical day/week in your role?
- ☐ What do you like most and least about your work?
- ☐ What kinds of problems and decisions do you encounter?
- ☐ How does your position fit within the organization/industry and what career paths exist?
- ☐ What accomplishments are valued in this field and what related careers should I consider?
- ☐ What steps should I take to prepare for this field in terms of education and skills?
- ☐ How is advancing technology affecting this industry and how is your company addressing this?
- ☐ What are the salary ranges and job outlook for this role?
- ☐ If your role was eliminated, what other kinds of work could you do?
- ☐ What is the industry's attitude towards work-life balance, diversity, and staying informed?

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EXPLORE OPTIONS

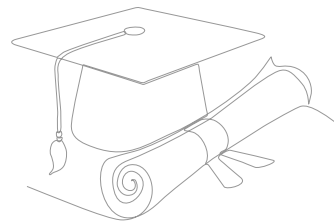

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STEP 3: MAKE CHOICES

Transferring after Kirkwood?



Transferring from a community college to a university is a significant step towards realizing your academic and career goals. The following are things to consider when transferring.



Start early and plan ahead

- Research potential universities with majors that interest you
 - Starting point resource: www.kirkwood.edu/advising
- Attend a Transfer Career Fair
 - Your academic advisor can provide more information about upcoming events
- Factors to consider: class size, faculty expertise, available research opportunities, and campus resources



Connect with your academic advisor

- Your academic advisor can help create a transfer plan, ensure prerequisites are met, and assist in choosing transferable courses
- Meet with transfer advisor at your chosen university to discuss similar questions



Research and visit potential universities

- Attending university open houses, information sessions, and campus tours can provide invaluable insight to the environment and culture of an institution
- Talk to students, meet with faculty, and ask to sit in on a lecture



Seek out transfer scholarships

- Many universities offer scholarships specifically for transfer students
- Ask your academic advisor for leads



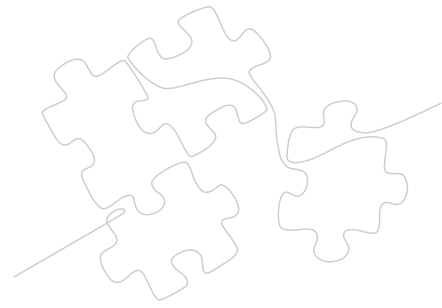
Stay organized with application deadlines

- Create a list of all universities that interest you along with the application deadlines and required documents
- Staying organized will prevent missed deadlines and last-minute rushes
